

Spotlight Interview: Festival 2009 Guest Artist Horace Young

How did you choose the flute?

My piano teacher's daughter played the flute and I used to hear her at my piano lessons. I attended these lessons with my sisters -along with ballet lessons (which I really hated). I soon realized that if I told my parents that I wanted to play something else, it would liberate me from having to go with my sisters to one of those activities. That's how I got out of ballet and into flute playing. Not too long afterwards, I heard Herbie Mann's "Memphis Underground" and that really made me take an interest in improvising. I later heard Hubert Laws on a recording my sister gave me and my addiction was complete.

Tell us about any musical influence in your family.

I feel that I am the worst musician in my immediate and extended family. Both my sisters played piano and sight-read much better than I and also sang and studied other instruments. They decided to pursue the fields of Law and Medicine, so that left me to carry the flag. Both of my parents loved music immensely and exposed us to a wide variety of genres and took us to as many live

performances as possible. When I decided to really get serious about music (age 17) it was this foundation that really helped me. As I got older and met other family members who were musicians, I became inspired by their accomplishments. Two of my more prominent cousins in the business include operatic performing artist, Barbara Smith Conrad, and jazz legend, Lester Young.

Think first of your listening audience. Without them we have no real support for what we do.

What are your goals/ plans for the future?

Since I play a variety of instruments and sing as well, most of my recordings have reflected that mix of sounds. It has been my life-long dream to record a CD that featured me on just the members of the flute family. I also am seeking to become completely fluent in Spanish within the next three to five years.

Who is your favorite composer?

Maurice Ravel

Tell us what is in your CD player right now.

Gulf Coast Blues and Impressions: A Hurricane Relief Benefit. George Winston, Solo Piano.

What is your favorite flute piece?

Sonata for Flute and Piano. Paul Hindemith, composer.

What is your favorite recording?

Le Tombeau de Couperin. Maurice Ravel, Composer. Recorded by Concertgebouw with Bernard Haitink conducting.

What time did you go to bed last night?

5AM

What qualities do you think are most essential to musical excellence?

Ability to focus for long periods of time, patience, and honesty.

Tell us about where you studied flute and the teachers you studied under.

My first teacher was a wonderful man named Hal Tennyson, who had been a student of Byron Hester in my hometown of Houston, TX. He also played saxophone and clarinet, a model that I followed as well after a number of years of study of flute singularly. When I attended college (Texas Southern University), I studied flute and saxophone with C.A. Tolbert, Aaron Horne and Robert Austin. Upon entering graduate school, I made the decision to focus solely on flute and studied with Albert Tipton (Shepherd School of Music/Rice University) and Frances Risdon (Washington State University).

What is the best advice you can offer our Texas Flute Community?

Keep having such wonderful Flute Festivals and work to bring the NFA Convention back to Texas – hopefully Houston.

Through the years, what has been the most valuable lesson that music has taught you?

Think first of your listening audience. Without them we have no real support for what we do.

What is the color of your toothbrush?

Blue and White.

What is your dream vacation?

To go back to Buenos Aires (when I am not working there) and spend a week.

What is the last book you read?

Beyond Talent: Creating A Successful Career in Music. Angela Myles Beeching, Author. Oxford University

SPOTLIGHT INTERVIEW MARILYN AREY, PAST PRESIDENT

How did you choose the flute? I didn't. It chose me. When I was in high school, I heard someone play the Mozart Concerto in G and was totally enamored with the sound. It was not until middle adulthood that I purchased a flute and began lessons.

Tell us about any musical influence in your family.

Both of my parents loved music; my mother, being Italian, enjoyed opera; my father had an enormous record collection that was quite eclectic everything from classical to big band and jazz. He played the trombone when he was young, but learned to play piano later in life.

They both taught me to be a life-long learner.

Tell us about where you studied flute and the teachers you studied **under.** I began studying flute about 10 years ago. My first teacher was Marshall Head, who taught my son bassoon. I met Claire Johnson at Floot Inferno, and studied with her

for a few years before moving to Singapore. She taught me a lot about sound, breathing, posture, and has challenged my thinking about many non-flute related concepts. In the process, she has become one of my closest friends. In Singapore, I studied for a short time with Emmanuel Saive, who was born in Geneva and studied at the Conservetoire in Lyon, France. To be honest, I have to say that I have not been playing my flute much lately.

What is the best advice you can offer our Texas Flute Community? I don't know that I have advice to offer, but I think I would like for everyone to be aware of what a special group of people the Texas Flute Community...and specifically the Texas Flute Society.... comprises. Even though I am not a professional flutist, I have been welcomed, accepted, and appreciated for what I can offer.

What are your goals/ plans for the future? Since I have not been playing my flute much in the last couple of

years, one of my plans is to start practicing on a daily basis with the hope that I will progress, even if it's slowly. Another goal is to design a 'green', energy efficient house that my husband, Richard, and I will build when he retires. I am open to whatever else comes along.

Who is your favorite composer? Mozart and Bach. I can't decide between the two.

Tell us what is in your CD player right now. Cantos y Danzas featuring Emmanuel Pahud on flute and Manuel Barrueco on guitar.

DEAR PIGGOLO

Dear Piggolo,

My band director tells me to roll my flute in and out on my chin to fix tuning issues. Is this correct? Sincerely, Fluta Muvin.

Dear Fluta,

What an excellent question! We all know that even though we may tune carefully at the beginning of rehearsal, there are always problem notes that just don't want to be in tune with the rest of the flute section. Band directors have a lot of things to worry about and fix, so often they use what works the fastest. While it is true that rolling your flute in will make you flatter and rolling it out will make you sharper, it is certainly not the best way to fix intonation-which is a fancy word for your state of in-tuneness. When you roll the flute in and out you also get some pretty unfortunate side effects: your tone quality changes, and your flute is not stable on your chin since it is being constantly changed for those problem notes. The better way to do this is to plant the flute in your best chin spot that allows enough room for your lips to be flexible enough to move. Then, adjust your lips to blow your airstream higher for flat notes (more bottom lip and keep that head up!) and lower for sharp notes (pull top lip down and more space between the teeth!). Make your lips do the work!

Dear Piggolo,

My band director says the only way for two piccolos to play in tune is to shoot one of them. I don't want to die. What should I do? Please help! Sincerely, Shaky Fingers.

Dear Shaky Fingers,

I'd consider investing in a tuner and a bullet-proof vest.




