

The Memory Map

Melissa Colgin-Abeln

Have you ever memorized a musical piece, played it effortlessly in rehearsal and then experienced disappointing results in performance? Are you memorization challenged? The Memory Map is for you! Learn how to construct a written "road map" of your music to enhance study/practice, increase memory skills, and attain more confidence under pressure. The process of mapping music into a condensed visual guide during practice pulls together the essential elements of study in a simple, practical way.

Shorthand notations illustrate form, harmony, melody, phrasing, rhythm, and dynamics. The method needn't be elaborate. A notepad with handwritten rhythms, a melodic skeleton, and/or directional lines within a framework of the form can do the trick. The musician can use as little or as much information to aid the learning process and trigger memory. Over time the map evolves with added details of the music as they are realized. (Also a valuable teaching tool.) This session, at the TFS Flute Festival, provides a fun, interactive workshop via power-point to illustrate simple ways to get started. More than a lecture, The Memory Map presentation provides attendees the opportunity to begin mapping with provided handout templates and examples.

Who is Anna Amalia?

It is not often that an 18th century princess is remembered as a composer. Born in Berlin in 1723, during the time of Louis XV of France and Peter the Great of Russia, Anna Amalia of Prussia is the daughter of Friedrich Wilhelm I of Prussia and Sophia Dorothea of Hanover.

Anna Amalia's Education

Anna was taught to play the flute, harpsichord and violin by her older brother, Frederick II. He, like Anna, was musically inclined. After her father died, she was able to begin to study music formally.



Anna Amalia, the Composer

Anna's serious study of music began when she was 35 years old. Her teacher was a former student of J.S. Bach. She is known for her small chamber pieces including sonatas (many for flute and piano), trios, cantatas and fugues. She wrote in an older, conservative style for her time so many think of her music as Baroque. She earned a modest amount of fame for her work as a composer. Only a few of her works have survived. It is thought that she may have destroyed them because she was very critical of her own work. She dedicated herself to music. Through her role as the Abbess of Quedlinburg in Germany she became known as a musical patron as well as a composer.

Interesting Facts

- Her father hated music so she had to practice secretly.
- Her family tried to set up an arranged marriage for her but she secretly married Baron Friedrich von der Trenck. This marriage was annulled and he was sent to jail for the rest of his life.
- Anna contributed to our musical archives by collecting and preserving more than 600 volumes of compositions by J.S. Bach, Handel, Telemann, etc. Her collection is housed in Berlin.




